Mayor's Corner

As many of you know, I love to drive around Town to search for areas of town that may need improvement and check on the status of current projects. I also love to share the details on the improvements we are making around Town. On my recent rounds, I see good progress being made on the improvements to Mill Ridge Ball Field #2. This field, which was badly in need of upgrades, is getting major renovations, including elevation, artificial turf, a new backstop, new dugouts, and bleachers. The project is set to be complete in a few months and will be ready for the upcoming baseball season. We are thankful that a project this big is partially funded by a Hudson County Open Space Grants totaling approximately \$950,000.00. As with many major projects, I am happy that we were able to get grant funds, to help minimize the impact on our Town's budget.

I also want to share another exciting project that is in the planning stages and we hope will be completed by the end of this year. Plaza Center, from Paterson Plank Road to Route 3, will be get a major upgrades, including curbs, sidewalks, decorative lighting, paving, new planters, bike racks, ADA-compliant sidewalk ramps, etc. When complete, I am sure the main entrance to our Town center will look more welcoming, modern, and beautiful. We have been applying for grants for this

project for a few years now, and I am happy to say our persistent efforts paid off and it will be covered by a \$850,000 grant from the NJDOT Local Transportation Projects Fund.

Other improvement projects in various stages of planning and design include reconstruction of the entire section of Seaview Drive, improvements to the Buchmuller Spray Park and construction of a rain garden at Trolley Park. We received grant funding for all of the aforementioned projects. I will share updates as these and other projects progress. Together, we will continue to make our Town better.

"The Chief for the Day program is one way to engage our youth, and excite them about their potential contributions, not just to the Police Department but also our community," said Chief Dennis Miller.

"Working with the KAI students to create something that we hope is meaningful in their schools was extremely rewarding. We hope it gets the attention of their peers," said Dave Bratton, Co-Advisor of KAI Coalition and Coordinator for

the Secaucus Coalition.

As part of their efforts to prevent underage drinking, the Secaucus Coalition would like you to remember:

- It is illegal to provide alcohol to those under the age of 21. Your children are the only exception.
- Studies show when parents give alcohol to their children, they are more likely to drink when their parents aren't around.
- Talk to your teen: maintain open and understanding communication, let them know your expectations, and provide clear and consistent warnings about the risks of underage drinking.
- Don't encourage the use of alcohol by allowing underage drinking or activities that promote it.

Become a Poll Worker

Secaucus needs you! We welcome residents to apply to become a poll worker in upcoming elections in June and November 2024.

Why Should You Apply:

- Earn \$21.43 per hour on in-person early voting days and \$300 on General Election Day.
- See our great democracy in action firsthand and enjoy the satisfaction of contributing to our community, state and country.

You can apply to serve as a poll worker in New Jersey if you:

- Are a United States citizen and a resident of New Jersey.
- Are a registered voter in the county in which you reside.
- Are at least 16 years of age. College and high school students are encouraged to apply. (Those under 18 years of age will work limited hours per shift and do not have to be registered to vote. Contact the County Board of Elections for further information).
- Are not running as a candidate in this election.

How to Apply:

- Visit the Town Clerk's office at 1203 Paterson Plank Road (2nd Floor) on weekdays, anytime between 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM.
- Ask for a Poll Worker application packet. Fill out and return the form with required documentation.
- Based on the need, the Town Clerk's office will reach out to you a few weeks before the election.

Waiting for the Pollinators

Spring is just around the corner, and it's time to start thinking about tidying up our gardens. But wait! Before you begin tossing away leaves and plant

stems, have you considered that you might also be throwing away the homes of bees, butterflies, moths, and other bugs that have been seeking shelter there during winter? These little pollinators, especially the native bees, hibernate in the hollow stems of plants like wild bergamot and swamp milkweed. Others lay their eggs in leaf litter, and we don't want to disrupt their home sweet home! At Imagine Garden, we strive to create a haven for wildlife all year round, so we prefer to leave stems and leaves over the winter and prune them



back when temperatures consistently reach the 50s. This way, caterpillars, native bees, and other critters can emerge just in time to provide food for baby birds and help kickstart the pollination cycle once again. You could consider this tip in your own backyard garden!


Event Raises Awareness of Youth Homelessness



On March 9th, over 50 young residents of Secaucus participated in the 2nd Annual Box City Sleep Out program designed to raise awareness of youth homelessness. During the program that ran from 5:00 PM until midnight, participants constructed and spent time in large cardboard box "homes" to simulate the conditions in which some youth homeless find shelter. Panelists from the Secaucus Department of Social Services, Secaucus Fire Department, Covenant House, and a wellness expert shared a range of information regarding the issues faced by homeless youth. The event was organized by Hygiene Project and was sponsored by the Secaucus Agent of State Farm Insurance with additional support from Hudson Regional Hospital. "It's our second year hosting the Box City event and we received amazing feedback from students who said it was a life-changing experience for them. Students left with a deeper understanding of homelessness and with greater empathy for people in difficult circumstances," said Cathy Wolf, Director of Hygiene Project.
