## Mayor's Corner

As I drive around, I am happy to see progress on major projects around Town. However, it makes me even happier to think that many of these projects are being funded by state, county and other grants we received. Grants make large infrastructure upgrades possible and minimize the impact on our budgets.

Long-awaited repairs on Meadowlands Parkway are currently underway thanks to a \$2,000,000 grant from the New Jersey Department of Transportation (NJDOT). We also recently received a \$500,000 grant from the NJDOT-Local Freight Impact Fund to repair and resurface Secaucus Road. We are hoping the work on Secaucus Road will begin before the end of this construction season. If not, the work will commence in the Spring of 2021.

In recent weeks we completed roadway and stormwater improvements on Franklin Street, funded by a \$450,000 grant from the NJDOT Municipal Aid Program. We are currently working on the Meadow Lane Roadway Preservation Project, which will be funded, in part, by a \$410,305 grant from NJDOT.

We will also be completing a reconstruction project on 6th Street and improvements to the parking lot at the top of Kane Stadium off Dorigo Lane, which serves as overflow parking for our

two senior buildings. Both of these projects are being partially funded by two Hudson County Community Development Block Grants in the amounts of \$87,500 and \$90,000 respectively.

While we are renovating roadways, we also want to make the best use of our open spaces. We are nearing completion on an amazing makeover of Schmidts Woods that is funded by a \$500,000 grant from the Hudson County Open Space Trust Fund. The exercise trail has been refurbished with new equipment, new surfacing was installed at the playground and paths and parking area have been repaved. I invite you to visit the woods as I know you will be happy to see the new improvements. We will also be refurbishing turf on Millridge Field #2, which will be funded by another \$500,000 Hudson County Open Space grant.

Stay tuned to more news about projects around Town. We will continue to work to keep Secaucus one of the best places to live in New Jersey.

## First SPD Community Meeting Held



In its ongoing effort to increase interaction between police and members of our community, the Secaucus Police Department will be holding periodic community Town Hall sessions. The first such meeting was held on Wednesday, August 12th at the Harmon Cove Club House parking lot. At this very well attended event, Chief Dennis Miller and SPD captains spoke about their work, shared updates on projects around Town, and answered resident questions.

“We want feedback from our community and would like to address issues in partnership with the community. That is the true meaning of a community-oriented police department,” said



Chief Dennis Miller at the start of the meeting. He said that several drug busts were made in recent months and perpetrators arrested based on resident tips. He announced that since he took over as Chief, he has reorganized the Police Department into

different departments, created a new anti-crime department, started several initiatives to facilitate police/resident interactions and is hiring retired police officers for school security. Speaking about the changes in progress, Chief Miller announced that the department is considering a K-9 addition, is doing more to address race related issues, and, as a result of an agreement with the Hudson County Sheriff, will be handling fewer calls at a County facility, which will free up more time for the SPD to respond to our residents and business community. He also introduced Police Officer Ensmann and his therapy dog Oakley.

Capt. Martin Moreda (Traffic), Capt. Carlos Goyenechea (Planning and Intelligence), Capt. Joseph Baccola (Records) and Detective Aniello Schaffer (Anti-crime) also shared updates from each of their departments.

The speakers then addressed resident concerns and questions. As additional community meetings are organized over the next few months, the SPD invites more officer/resident interaction. Say hello to officers on their walking, bicycle and Segway patrols around Town. ## Attention: Residents Using Life-Sustaining Equipment

If you or a member of your household rely on electricity to operate life-sustaining equipment, such as a respirator or dialysis machine, it is important that you notify PSE&G. When notified, PSE&G will send you a form that must be completed and signed by the prescribing medical professional every year to verify the use of life-sustaining equipment. Once the form is returned and approved by PSE&G, your account will have an indicator that life-sustaining equipment is used in your home. PSE&G will notify you of any power outages and time when it will be restored. Regardless, you should have a back-up plan such as a generator or moving to a location with electric service so you can continue to use life-sustaining equipment. ## Secaucus Public Library Annex Opens



Secaucus now has a new Library Annex, conveniently located at Xchange! The Secaucus Public Library Katherine Steffens Annex was inaugurated on Saturday, August 1st, 2020. Ex-Director of the Secaucus Public Library, Katherine Steffens, led the ribbon-cutting with Mayor Michael Gonnelli, Town Council member James Clancy, Secaucus Public Library Director Jenifer May, members of the Library Board of Trustees and Branch Manager Lisa Machno.

“A community is known by its library,” said Mrs. Steffens in her remarks. She outlined and appreciated Secaucus Public Library’s growth since its initial opening in the attic of the old Town Hall building in 1935. In 1957, it moved to space where the Town Museum is now located. With expanding collections, new technology and ADA requirements, a larger state of the art facility was built at the current site at 1379 Paterson Plank Road in 2003. The growth reflects both the needs of the community as well as the commitment by the Town to provide engaging spaces and activities for all its residents. The new library is true to Mrs. Steffens’

advice to “stay relevant.” Going by the warm, modern, well-designed, child-friendly design, it promises to be a useful and attractive addition to the facilities in Town.

The Library Annex offers limited public access, contactless Grab & Go pickup service, a wide range of online services, virtual children’s programs, book return drop box, WiFi, copier-printer-scanner machines and computer help. Patrons can even “check out” laptops for in-premise use at a laptop kiosk. Currently, the Annex Library is open Monday and Wednesday 4:00 PM to 8:00 PM, Tuesday and Thursday 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM. Additional hours will be added soon. There are several virtual programs lined up and the Annex plans on having in-person programs including storytelling, Sensory Story Time and Pajama Storytime as soon as COVID-19 restrictions are lifted.

## Census Takers to Visit Homes

In order to ensure complete count of all residents, census takers will visit the homes of residents who have not yet responded to census. The census taker will wear a mask and follow all local public health guidelines when they visit your home. All census takers complete a virtual COVID-19 training on social distancing and other health and safety protocols before beginning their work.

Census takers are hired from our area, and their goal is to help you and everyone in your home be counted in the 2020 Census. If the census taker who visits your home does not speak your language, you may request a return visit from a census taker who does speak your language. Please be sure to check they have a valid ID badge with their photograph with a U.S. Department of Commerce watermark and an expiration date. Census workers may also carry Census Bureau bags and other equipment with the Census Bureau logo.
