Happy Holidays!

As the year comes to an end, I am proud to recap the installation of installation of the installation of t

significant improvements we made to our infrastructure and open spaces over the past year. You may have already noticed better driving conditions and enhanced curb appeal in several sections of Town due to repaved roads along with new sections of sidewalk, curbing and driveway aprons. We recently finished construction on the entire stretch of Centre Avenue, a portion of Grace Avenue, and Mansfield Avenue. Significant improvements to Seaview Drive, Pandolfi Avenue and Raydol Avenue are coming soon.

We completed so many great projects this year on the recreational front. Construction was completed on Marcial Memorial Park at the end of Farm Road and I have received tremendous feedback on the park and the overall improvement to the area. The acquisition of the land for use by all residents was a major accomplishment and the park is being enjoyed by many! Furthermore, permanent pickleball courts at Buchmuller Park have been constructed and will be ready for use soon. We also officially opened the Imagine Garden on Meadowlands Parkway-a great space for residents to garden and to enjoy the beauty of native plants. Watch for details about a new spray feature coming to the children's section of Buchmuller Park and a new passive park on Louis Street. Lastly, in the next year, you will see improvements at Shetik Field and Mill Ridge baseball field #2.

In our continuing efforts towards greener energy and reducing our carbon footprint, we completed the

installation of solar panels on the roofs of the Ice Rink at Buchmuller Park and the Recreation Center on Koelle Boulevard. The solar panels were part of a larger project to improve efficiency throughout our buildings and we are pleased that the project is nearly completed.

When you drive up Center Avenue, you will notice the quick progress on the construction of our brand new Community Center. I am

looking forward to its completion next year. It will be a great facility for our seniors and community to gather.

I cannot emphasize enough that a significant portion of the major improvement projects are funded by federal, state and county grants. Our Administration consistently applies for, and is successful in receiving grants that allow us to make infrastructure improvements while minimizing the impacts on our budget. Last year alone, we received \$6.9 million in grant funds, helping us keep taxes stable while continuing improvements that make Secaucus a great Town to live.

With your continued support, our Town will remain a great place to live and raise your families. The Town Council and I are here for you, and wish you and your family a very Happy Holiday Season, Merry Christmas and a great start to the New Year!

Town Receives FEMA Funds

The Mayor and Town Council are happy to announce that Secaucus received a reimbursement of \$772,250.00 from FEMA for emergency repairs on the North End berm after Hurricane Sandy. The 2012 hurricane was one of the costliest disasters in New Jersey, with over \$30 billion in damage caused by high waves, wind gusts and a storm surge spurred by high tide. Several areas in Town, including coastal flood-mitigation infrastructure, were impacted. Emergency and long term repairs to the north end berms were completed and the Town applied for reimbursement for the associated costs. Even though the process took years, the Town's administration completed every step of the process meticulously, and consistently followed up with FEMA. These efforts led to the eventual reimbursement to the Town.

Officers Spangenberg and Kelly Revive Unresponsive Woman

On November 6, 2023, two police officers, later assisted by EMT personnel from Hudson Regional Hospital, did one of the most thankful things anyone can wish for. They responded to a call about an unresponsive female staff member at the Hudson County Meadowview Campus. Upon arriving, Officers Nicholas Spangenberg and Kasey Kelly discovered that the

victim was not breathing and had no pulse. They performed CPR, and after further assessing the situation, utilized their Automated External Defibrillator (AED) to administer one shock to the victim. Thankfully, they found a pulse shortly afterwards. Hudson Regional Hospital EMTs who arrived on the scene, immediately transported the victim, but also administered an AED shock to her onboard the ambulance. She was stabilized at Hudson Regional Hospital and was later transported to



Englewood Hospital for immediate cardiac care.

For their commendable actions and teamwork, Mayor Gonnelli and the Town Council honored Officers Spangenberg and Kelly and presented them with a proclamation at the November 28th Town Council meeting.

"I am extremely proud of these officers and commend their determination in performing these life saving measures. I am especially proud that these officers utilized their training and the equipment provided to them, worked as a team and were able to bring this victim back to life. I also commend Hudson Regional Hospital EMS for their efforts and thank the hospital's staff for their ongoing commitment to public safety in Secaucus," said Chief Dennis Miller.

Town Receives Grant for Renovation of Pandolfi and Raydol Avenues



The Mayor and Town Council are happy to announce that Secaucus received a Municipal Aid Grant in the amount of \$528,185.00 for roadway improvements on Pandolfi Avenue and Raydol Avenue. The award was announced on November 1, 2023. When a formal award letter is received, the Town will move into engineering design and construction bid phases for repaving the entire stretch of Pandolfi Avenue and the cement section of Raydol Avenue. Based on the engineer's recommendation, select sections of sidewalks, curbs and driveway aprons will also be replaced. Construction is expected to begin in Spring/ Summer 2024.

Secaucus Honors Our Veterans

November 11th is a special day in our country and in Secaucus. It is a day set aside to honor our veterans in many special ways. Events and programs in Secaucus started off in early October when banners honoring our veterans were hoisted throughout the town. The banners, organized by the Knights of Columbus, were displayed the entire month of November.

On November 3rd, Huber Street School held a touching assembly to honor



veterans. Fourth graders welcomed gathered veterans with patriotic songs and a special reading of "America's White Table" by Margot Theis Raven. Following the Veteran's Day tradition, they also set up a small dining table with a white tablecloth, a setting with lemon and salt on a plate, and an empty chair to honor service members fallen, missing or captive. Then, fifth grade students led the veterans to the front of the school where they respectfully lined up small American flags with their family names written on them. The students also fundraised and presented a check of \$380.00 each to American Legion and the Secaucus VFW 3776.

On November 9th, Hudson County hosted the annual Veteran of the Year

Award Ceremony at County Prep High School. Our own Philip Papa was honored along with 10 other veterans from around the County. Phil Papa is known for his ardent support for the welfare of all veterans and is vocal about the plight of veterans returning from the Vietnam War.
